Patience for a Good Harvest

A friend of mine is a death row chaplain. He was there the night a man was brought to prison on a murder charge. The arrested man had committed one hundred twenty-nine crimes in nine weeks in order to support a cocaine habit. The man was angry, violent, and out of control. Patiently, the chaplain prayed, at first alone, then with the prisoner. My friend did not judge the man. Instead he persevered mercifully and with compassion. In time, the prisoner had a conversion. Although he faces death, the man is now baptized and has helped prepare a video tape for youth, urging them to make good decisions. His witness has led three other death row inmates to Christ. Good can, indeed, come from something that at first looks bad. Weeds in the wheat field, at first, seem bad; but who knows? With patience, mercy, and love something good may come of them.

FIRST READING: Wisdom 12:13, 16–19 RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 86:5–6, 9–10, 15–16
SECOND READING: Romans 8:26–27 GOSPEL: Matthew 13:24–43 [24–30]

Comment

God's supremacy is clear in the reading from Wisdom. God is all-knowing, just, and powerful. Our hearts, thoughts, and actions are clear to God before we even know them. Even with incomprehensible power, God is patient. The words of Wisdom show us how God tempers justice with mercy and how God's actions teach us to be patient, fair, and hopeful.

Paul encouraged the Romans to be patient through the trials of this life. The fretting is really not worth the effort when compared to the glory God has in store for us. We are saved in the hope of what is unseen, and we need to be patient in order to receive God's promise of heaven. Even when we lack patience, the Spirit helps us and gives us the heart to hope, wait, and pray.

Jesus tells a parable about wheat and weeds in Matthew's Gospel. After planting good seeds of wheat, an enemy came along to the field and spread weed seeds. When the plants popped through the soil, the workers were upset to see so many weeds and wanted to pull them out. The owner encouraged the workers to be patient—to let them grow together until the harvest. Whatever weeds were left, the workers were to bundle and burn.

Reflection

All three readings today challenge us to be patient. That's a tall order for a culture immersed in satellite dishes, fax machines, mobile phones, the Internet, and compact discs filled with volumes of information. Often we are in such a hurry that we don't take the time to look at all the aspects of a situation. Our hurry causes us to judge quickly. We may judge other people, or judge a case, coming to the conclusion that it does not warrant our time. Patience, however, gives us time to do God's work among the wheat and the weeds. Rather than appraise the weeds as evil and lost causes, we are shown by God's example to wait patiently and lovingly for the final judgment that belongs to God alone.

Why Is Mary Called 'Queen of Heaven'?

Bathsheba was the mother of King Solomon of Israel (see 1 Kgs 1:28-30). As any loving son would V/ 41 (see Ex 20:12). So even though the highest officials of do, he obeyed God's command to honor his mother the kingdom bowed when they came before his throne, Solomon himself stood and bowed before her when she entered the court.

Once he sat down again on his throne, "a throne was provided for the king's mother, who sat at his right" (1 Kgs 2:19), the highest place of honor he could give her. Then, when she interceded there with the king for his subjects, he gladly granted her request (see 1 Kgs 2:20).

Why did Bathsheba have her own throne at her son's right hand? Why did she receive such exalted honor at court? After all, she herself had not been born in a palace. Nevertheless, Bathsheba had borne this magnificent royal son. That made her the queen mother of the land, despite whatever humble circumstances from which she herself may have come.

Now consider this: Solomon may have been one of the most illustrious and powerful kings in biblical history. But his splendor pales to nothing beside the radiant glory of his descendant Jesus Christ, the "King of kings and Lord of lords," ruler of all the nations (see RV 19:16; 15:4). Jesus fulfilled the prophecy that from David's throne would rule a Prince of Peace whose kingdom would be universal and everlasting (see Is 9:5-6). That throne is now "in the heavens, far above every principality, authority, power and dominion" (Eph 1:20-21).

If Solomon honored Bathsheba so highly as his queen mother, how much more must Jesus honor Mary as his own? How much more exalted must be the woman — however lowly her original state (see Lk 1:48) — who bore the Son of God, Sovereign of the universe? No doubt her throne, too, is at the right hand of her Son's throne in heaven. And no doubt, just as Solomon was eager to grant his mother's requests, so Jesus gladly responds to her intercession for his subjects.

Mary's exalted role among the saints also reflects her extraordinary position as our great exemplar of faith, the prototype of the Christian disciple. With St. Elizabeth, we say to her: "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled" (Lk 1 :45).

In St. John's vision of heaven, the "woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars," bore a son "destined to rule all the nations"(Rv 12: 1, 5). Is it any wonder that in such a portrait, Catholics see Mary, Queen of Heaven?
