I also firmly accept and hold each and every thing that is proposed by the Church definitively regarding teaching on faith and morals.

Moreover, I adhere with religious submission of will and intellect to the teachings which either the Roman Pontiff or the college of bishops enunciate when they exercise the authentic magisterium even if they proclaim those teachings in an act that is not definitive."

*FIRST READING: Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18 RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 34:2-3, 17-18, 19, 23
SECOND READING: 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18 GOSPEL: Luke 18:9-14*

Comment

The Pharisee in today's Gospel passage expects God's favor and attention. After all, he is one of those set apart by his dedication to religious observance. The tax collector expects nothing. After all, he is a collaborator with the Romans and, in all probability, a thief. Jesus tells this story neither to condemn or laud the Pharisee for who he is nor to condemn or laud the tax collector for who he is. Rather, Jesus uses the story to point out the difference between the two men's attitudes—trust.

The Pharisee trusts in himself, in his own good works. He offers praise, true, but it is not praise directed to God, but self-congratulation. He asks God for nothing, because he figures he needs nothing, for he has granted himself his salvation. The tax collector, however, focuses on God in his plea for mercy. He recognizes that he is a sinner and knows that he doesn't have the power to save himself, only God does. And God does just that.

In the second reading, the Pharisee Paul is boasting. But Paul's boast is different from that of the Pharisee in the Gospel. Paul acknowledges from whom his strength has come and acknowledges that he will receive his "crown" not by means of his merit, but by the saving grace of God.

Reflection

Read again the first sentence of today's Gospel: "Jesus addressed this parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else." "Righteousness," "despised:" these are harsh terms. Jesus is pointing his finger at the proud and haughty in his own community, those who view themselves as "the saved." But are they? Or are they guilty of presumption, a very old-fashioned kind of sinful pride that supposes that God's mercy is their private preserve to the exclusion of others—to the exclusion of "sinners." There is a clubhouse sort of faith. The Pharisee offers God thanks, and for good reason: he avoids sin of every sort—except one. In shunning sin, he also shuns sinners, the very ones to whom Jesus came to proclaim the Good News of salvation. By coldly excluding sinners, by holding them in contempt, the self-righteous also exclude God's mercy, the very goodness and kindness of God that the tax collector pleads for in his sense of unworthiness. Salvation for the Pharisee is a matter of merit. For the tax collector, it is a matter of mercy. Guess who's right. Better, guess who Jesus says stands justified before God.
