### THIRTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

### **Heart to Heart**

"Heart speaks to heart" was the motto of Cardinal John Henry Newman. This man of great learning was also a pastor and a man of exquisite spiritual insight. He valued and balanced mind and heart. His learning was brought to the service of the needs of his companions as well as those in his charge.

First Reading: Wisdom 1:13–15; 2:23–24 Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 30:2, 4, 5–6, 11, 12, 13 Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 8:7, 9, 13–15 Gospel: Mark 5:21–43 [21–24, 35b–43]

### Comment

Among the Old Testament books, the book of Wisdom was written a mere handful of years before the birth of Jesus. Its words are a balm to us: God does not "rejoice in the destruction of the living. ... The creatures of the world are wholesome, and there is not a destructive drug among them ..." (1:13, 14)

This first reading skips to a reflection on the life and death of the soul. The reading omits the sardonic riff mimicking the materialist, who decides essentially that in the face of our inevitable physical death, we ought to eat, drink, and be merry. The materialist scorns the upright and just people because they rebuke those who seek material comforts. Today, the writer of Wisdom says that the materialist has it all wrong. We are imperishable. There is for us no second death, no death of the human spirit made in God's image.

Nor does Jesus rejoice in the destruction of the living. His presence and touch bring life. Further, he risks the sarcasm and opprobrium of the powerful. Today's Gospel sets before us a miracle wrapped in a miracle. An official of the synagogue begs Jesus to come to his home, for his little daughter is deathly ill. Jesus walks with this man, and on the way, a woman's need overcomes her fear. She reaches out simply to touch his garment. She is cured. Then her boldness comes to light. Even though crowds crush upon Jesus, the woman is discovered. She confesses her faith in Jesus' ability to cure her, and he declares that her faith cured her. He bids her go on her way forever freed from the source of illness and sin.

The child, too, is awakened from either a deep and deadly sleep or from death itself; one cannot tell. And it does not matter, really. She is cured, and Jesus asks that she be attended to. She is healthy enough to keep food down. A good sign.

These are touching miracles, literally and figuratively. Jesus cannot seem to help himself. Two desperate people reach out to him. Jesus responds, though it is against the Law that prohibits touching one with an issue of blood and touching the dead. Jesus knew and acted on a deep knowledge that God does not "rejoice in the destruction of the living" and that "the creatures of the world are wholesome" (Wisdom 1:13, 14).

### Reflection

Jesus set out to save people, not to win arguments. Today, his compassionate words and actions reveal the deepest truth of his life and of God's life, too. For God did not make death or desire the destruction of the living. Interestingly, in the *Divine Comedy*, Dante pictures the very depths of hell as ice, not fire, for the cold, white paralysis of ice so aptly depicts the hellish state of lovelessness. Jesus chooses death's opposite—the warmth and light that draws us as surely as a lost child is drawn to the porch light, as the ship on the storm-tossed sea searches for the beacon.

The way of compassion so clearly enunciated as the ideal in the Book of Wisdom is enfleshed in the generous companionship of Jesus as he walks with desperate Jairus and is accosted by an equally desperate woman who pushes herself forward in such an unseemly manner. Jesus does not stand on ceremony; he does not claim special privileges. He leans toward Jairus, toward the woman, toward the child. This is how he wins hearts. This is how heart speaks to heart.

And this is how Paul exhorts his fellow Christians at Corinth. Actually, he's soliciting contributions from the richer church for the poorer ones. They are rich in faith and discourse and knowledge. He wants them to abound in charity, and he has a good ideas about how they might demonstrate that charity.
