# TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

#### **Service**

Service jobs don't pay very well. The service sector is not very highly regarded. Nonetheless, Christians have always favored service. Jesus thought highly of service and servants. He was one. He wants us to follow him.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 53:10–11 RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Psalm 33:4–5, 18–19, 20, 22 SECOND READING: Hebrews 4:14–16 GOSPEL: Mark 10:35–45 [42–45]

## Comment

The first and second readings balance each other and give us some kind of equilibrium and strength to continue in our journey as disciples. The first words announced to us today are nothing short of frightening: "The LORD was pleased to crush him in infirmity." God pleased? People crushed? What are we to make of this? The inscrutable ways of the earth and of creatures sometimes require much of the exiled people (God's beloved people) to whom Isaiah spoke. God seems to allow the suffering of the innocent to go on and on, with intervention or relief.

This first reading is part of a prophecy that looks unblinkingly on the suffering of the innocent one. Isaiah boldly and insightfully says that through (not after) this suffering many will be saved. This insight continues in the second reading. When our idea of suffering and our idea of God are in collision, our idea of God may need to change. God does not ride serenely in the heavens above it all, but suffers in the innocent one. This last, innocent suffering one is the one to whom we can look for help in our time of need.

The sons of Zebedee were all for the triumph and cared not a whit for the difficulties—the inevitable suffering. Jesus was remarkably calm and patient when he gave James and John his full attention. Jesus inquired about their assessment of courage under fire. Together they assured Jesus that they would stand up to whatever adversity they might have to face in following him on their way to the coveted thrones at the right and left.

Jesus assured them that there would be enough adversity to go around, but he was not sure about the final rewards. We have here a candid disclosure from Jesus. We tend to assign him the qualities of God, which rob him of his human qualities. He corrects this. He identifies with his disciples, even these overzealous two. He doesn't know God's future plans, and they don't either. They will share his journey; they will share his reward, but the reward is not his to give. That is the Father's doing.

#### Reflection

The narrative broadens to include the indignant disciples who were clearly annoyed at this grab for power by James and John. Jesus is not going to follow the familiar ranking order. He will not be a mighty one who wrests power from the weak and then uses it against the vanquished, just so they remember they are overruled and feel the heel of the ruler's boot.

For Jesus, the mark of greatness is service. The leader, ruler, throne-dweller, is the one who has no throne. The leader is the one who serves, and in the end, who gives his life up for the others—his whole life. James and John and the rest of the disciples did not quite count on Jesus' answer being this all-consuming. There are new norms in the kingdom Jesus promises, and these norms turn upside-down everything that society believes to be important. The rich are not powerful. The strong are not superior. The greatest people of Jesus' kingdom are the ones who serve others. This service is completely from the heart and it is a loving act. The servant comes with no hope of recompense, for Jesus made it clear that the servant will be rewarded abundantly in his kingdom. The other disciples were as unclear as James and John about this new kingdom, but they certainly had a sense that it would be different from the sort of rule they knew. In reality, that's about all we know, too. There was a trust the other disciples had, and we must trust as well.

#### MIRACLES THAT WERE ATTRIBUTED TO THERESE

Therese became a saint in the hearts of the people. A person is declared venerable when there is evidence of extraordinary holiness and inspiration of others. It means that cause of their canonization is being pursued. The first miracle was Sister Louise of St. Germain, was cured of the stomach ulcers she had between 1913 & 1916. Another miracle involved Charles Anne, a 23 year old seminarian who was dying from advanced pulmonary tuberculosis. The night he thought he was dying, Charles prayed to Therese. Afterward the doctor testified, "The destroyed and ravaged lungs had been replaced by new lungs, carrying out their normal functions and about to revive the entire organism. In 1925 two cures had been invested and judged to be supernatural. Gabrielle Trimusi was healed of arthritis of the knee and tubercular lesions on the vertebrae. Maria Pellemans was healed from pulmonary tuberculosis which had spread, as Therese illness had to the intestines. After visiting Therese grave, Maria the doctor testified was transformed. After a long struggle with tuberculosis, Therese died on September 30, 1897, at the age of 24. Her last words were the story of my life, "My God, I love you." On May 17, 1925, Therese was officially declared a Saint by Pope Pius XI
